Rocks of Faith

My husband and I have been to the Holy Land and walked the streets of Jesus' day. We went to the town of Nazareth and saw a re-enactment of those early days. We saw a shepherd with his flock and a carpenter with his tools. It was not an easy life. We also noticed there are very few trees with which to build structures. Early shepherds used caves for protection, and houses were made of stone.

Because the people used stones for building, they could readily identify with the idea of Jesus being a "Rock." They understood that a structure had to have a solid foundation and that rocks had to be fit together to make it strong and secure.

Isaiah 26:3-5: "You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you. Trust in the Lord forever, for the Lord, the Lord himself, is the Rock eternal. He humbles those who dwell on high, he lays the lofty city low; he levels it to the ground and casts it down to the dust."

I Corinthians 3:10-13: "But each one should build with care. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ. If anyone builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay or straw, their work will be shown for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each person's work."

Once we understand Jesus is the solid rock upon which we are going to build, then we must examine the stones. The first layer of stones must be large rocks of faith. There are some things that are unprovable by the scientific method which we learned in school. Some things have to be accepted by faith. By faith, we believe that Jesus was with God in the beginning and that He was actively involved in the whole creation process.

Genesis 1:26: "Then God said, 'Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground'."

After man sinned in the garden, God already had a plan in place to bring us back into fellowship with Him. He planned to send an unblemished Lamb as a sacrifice. That Lamb, Jesus, was offered during a Passover festival as the one and only sacrifice needed to take away our sins.

John 1:29: "The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!"


After He was offered for our sins, God raised Jesus from the dead. He acts now as a go-between for God and man.

Rock of Faith


What do Thomas Edison, Steve Jobs, Tom Cruise, John F. Kennedy, and Cher have in common? They all have "dyslexia" (when the brain reverses words and letters, making reading difficult). As a child, Thomas Edison was sent home from school with a note from his teacher which said, "Your child is dumb. We can't do anything for him." Mrs. Edison responded, "You do not understand my boy. I will teach him myself."

My friend, Mark, has dyslexia. He is not famous like the others. Growing up in rural Appalachia, his dyslexia was discovered in the second grade. From second through fifth grade Mark needed special help to read.

One day in fifth grade, Mark returned from his special reading class to his regular class. Looking at the chalkboard, Mark was surprised to see his name listed on the board along with a few other students. Quickly he realized this was the list of students who made the honor roll. For once, Mark felt a sense of accomplishment. That feeling didn't last. What happened next left a deep scar on Mark. A student teacher had placed his name on the board. When the main teacher returned to the classroom, she began reading the names on the list out loud, giving recognition to the honor roll students. Coming to Mark's name, she paused, and then announced in front of the class, "He can't be on the honor roll; he has a learning disability." She proceeded to erase Mark's name from the chalkboard. His name was erased, but the deep sense of failure and embarrassment remained. Mark continued to struggle with dyslexia through grade school, junior high, and high school. Many thought he would not graduate from high school.

As a Christian, Mark believed God was faithful to His promises. The one promise Mark held on to was penned by Paul, a man who realized he, too, had a weakness.

"My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness. Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 12:9, 10).



Mark depended on God. Mark says, "I have overcome many obstacles, but I don't believe I have greater obstacles than others. I choose to claim God's power and realize that in my weakness, God can do His greatest work."

What is your obstacle, pain, suffering, trial, or weakness? God can be your rock of faith, in your difficulty.

Mark wanted to preach. He knew that meant a bachelor's and most likely a master's degree. He was told he would not do well in college and that he would never make it as a preacher. Others said if a church ever found out that he had a learning disability, he would be fired. Even his Bible professor discouraged him from going to graduate school. Trusting God and depending on Him, Mark went on to get a degree from college, and then a master's.

Today Mark has been in ministry over 25 years. He preaches for a large congregation in Appalachia. He teaches Bible classes and is an adjunct Bible professor at a Christian university. He has baptized over 50 people and written and published Christian books.

Mark says, "My help came from the Lord. When no one else seems to be there, He is always there for me." God truly is our rock of faith, and it is in our weaknesses He can do His greatest work!
