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If Heaven's Not My Home

"This world is not my home. I'm just passing through, If heaven's not my home, then Lord what will I do?" We sing the song; and as Christians it has deep spiritual meaning, but what does it mean to people who are not faithful, or to those who do not profess any religion? Some people do not believe there is a heaven or a hell. Romans 3:23 says, "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," and in Matthew 7:21-23 Jesus says, "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of My Father who is in heaven will enter. 22 Many will say to Me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in Your name, and in Your name cast out demons, and in Your name perform many miracles?' 23 And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; leave me, you who practice lawlessness." It is not wise to dispute the words of Jesus. One friend believes ungodly people will be burned, but it will be a flash fire. It will be all over in an instant and they will merely no longer exist. Matthew 25:41 tells us there will be eternal fire. Mark 9:43 calls it an unquenchable fire, one that burns eternally. It won't be a flash fire. It will be ongoing for eternity with no do overs. We are told of eternal destruction in II Thessalonians 1:7-9. "...when the Lord Jesus will be revealed from heaven with His mighty angels 8 in flaming fire, dealing out retribution to those who do not know God, and to those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus. ⁹These people will pay the penalty of eternal destruction, away from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power," Jude 1:13 and Matthew 25:30 speak of outer darkness. We know God is light, but for those in punishment there will be "outer darkness." That sounds like the kind where you cannot see your hand in front of your face. If you have ever experienced that sort of darkness, you know how terrifying it can be. Matthew 25:30 speaks of weeping and gnashing of teeth. The account of the rich man and Lazarus shows we will have memory of our former life and those we influenced. We will realize

others we love could probably join us or may even already be there with us. I cannot imagine the agony of knowing that. When people say they cannot believe a loving God would not condemn anyone to that sort of punishment, I tell them He does not send them there. They choose that destination. The loving God in scripture sent many men to teach us what He expects. From the beginning of time, He has given man instructions on how to please him. He also sent his son to die for our sins. He allowed his son to pay the price of death on the cross in our place so we could join Him in heaven. Jesus told us he was going to prepare a place for us. It would be a place with many rooms, and Revelation gives us descriptions of glory. It speaks of gates of pearl and streets of transparent gold. We recognize this as figurative language, but it was the best John could do to make us realize how splendid and precious it is. In Revelation 21 we get a detailed description of what heaven will be like including "God himself will be with them and be their God. 4 'He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death' or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." We have a choice. We can choose to obey the instructions given in scripture and thus be allowed to be a part of that beautiful scene; or we can choose to disobey, and by doing so, chose eternal punishment. These facts being so, we can truly sing, "This world is not my home, I just passing through. If heaven's not my home, then Lord what will I do?" I pray we all choose wisely.

The above song can be found as No. 885 in our songbook, Songs of Faith & Praise. I love the words and wish we still those the old songs and hymns. It was written in 1920. Verse 1 and the chorus are as follows:

We read of a place that's called Heaven, It's made for the pure and the free; These truths in God's word He has given, How beautiful heaven must be. How beautiful heaven must be,

Sweet home of the happy and free; Fair haven of rest for the weary, How beautiful heaven must be.

I had a friend and sister-in-Christ who often asked me what I thought heaven would be like. She was anxiously waiting to go there. I had no answer to give her except, "I don't know." I just know it is going to be wonderful and beautiful, words that are **so** inadequate to describe it. No imagination can picture it. No one in our realm knows the wonder and awe of it. What I do know is that is where I long to be.

Genesis 1:1: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." 'The heavens' here refers to the sky or firmament, the first heaven. It is what we see when we gaze into the sky (Genesis 1:6-8). The second heaven is what we call 'space,' the universe. He is not referring to the third heaven, God's dwelling place. Just as Jehovah has no beginning or end, His home is eternal. In Matthew 25:34, Jesus says, "Come you who are blessed by my Father, take your inheritance, the kingdom of heaven prepared for you since the creation of the world."

Christians can only see heaven with the eye of faith, through scripture. In 2 Corinthians 12:2-7, Paul writes, "I know a man in Christ, who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven. Whether it was in the body or out of the body, I do not know. God knows. And I know that this man, whether in the body or apart from the body, I do not know-but God knows-was caught up to paradise. He heard inexpressible things, things that man is not permitted to tell. I will boast about a man like that but I will not boast about myself except about my weaknesses. Even if I should choose to boast I would not be a fool because I would be speaking the truth. To keep me from becoming conceited because of these surpassingly great revelations, there was given me a thorn in the flesh, a messenger of satan to torment me." (NIV)

Paul is talking about himself. He doesn't understand why God allowed him to 'see' paradise, but he knows what he saw was so wondrous he would never be permitted to tell anyone. He could not express it in human language anyway! I cannot imagine what Paul saw, but it should give Christians even greater hope and yearning to go there.

Revelation 21:10-27 and 22:1-5 give us a glimpse of heaven in symbolic language. In 22:1-5 John writes, "Then the angel showed me the river of life as clear as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the lamb down the middle of the great street of the city. On each

side of the river stook the tree of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month. And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. Nolonger will there be any curse. The throne of God and of the Lamb will be in the city, and His servants will serve Him. They will see His face, and His name will be on their foreheads. There will be no more night. They will not need the light of a lamp of the light of the sun, for the Lord God will give them light and they will reign forever and ever."

To realize that I will some day go to that place blows my mind! To think that Jesus loved me so much He went to the cross and took my place so that I could have eternal life with Him. As I get oler, I look forward more and more to going to my eternal home. My focus has changed drastically over the years from the temporary to the eternal. My prayer for all Christians is that our focus be changed from the physical to the spiritual. We must live in the world but not be of the world. None of us knows the hour of our physical death. 2 Peter 3:13 says, "But in keeping with His promise, we are looking forward to a new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness." It was late September, and a strong, cold wind was howling.

Border agents examined our passports, glanced over the interior of our car, examined the contents of our trunk,

and asked a few questions. They took our papers and went inside their office very briefly. They brought back our passports and an assortment of Montana tourist information. More importantly, they welcomed us back to America. I felt like I was home, despite still being far away. Though we were still more than 1,200 miles from Rolla, Missouri, it felt so good to be back on American soil!

While we were in Canada, I was keenly aware that I am not a citizen of Canada. The Canadian people were not unfriendly, and no one treated us badly during our short visit there. It just was not home.

Many years ago, I found myself in another far country. Physically, I had not gone far, but I had spiritually wandered far from home. While I was in that far country, I dreamed of home. But I couldn't seem to find my way back home. Eventually, I "headed home" in a spiritual sense, to my spiritual home (the Lord's church), much like when we turned our car to the south and headed home from Canada.
