Contentment

Several years ago, an elderly lady received a notification from the Reader's Digest contest committee that read, "This is to notify you that you have won our million-dollar prize..." The lady immediately stopped reading and went into a panic.

Unlike most people, she fretted for a couple of days and then sat down to write a letter to the committee informing them they needed to give that prize to someone else. She had failed to read the following huge "if" in that packet. If she returned the enclosed documents, if her number was drawn from the thousands returned, etc. She thought she truly had already won.

She wrote the company to say she had all the resources she could manage and please give her award to someone more needy than she. That lady truly was content with what she had financially. However, there were other stresses in her life. She suffered through cancer. She also had a wayward daughter who was estranged from the rest of the family. In those areas of her life, she was far from content.

We all encounter various issues that keep us from finding peace and contentment, so how should we cope? 1 Timothy 6:6 tells us, "But godliness actually is a means of great gain when accompanied by contentment." That sounds wonderful, but how do we do that?

To start, we need to develop our faith. Matthew 6:25-34 tells us to not be anxious, because if God cares for the birds of the air and the lilies of the field,

will He not care for us even more?

Matthew 6:34 tells us, "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."

A sound roof on the house, a warm furnace, warm clothing, and food on the table were enough. God was good. If I wandered the stores, or cruised the catalogs, I tended to mourn all the lovely things I did not have. I found the saying, "out of sight, out of mind," worked for me. I just didn't go seeking things currently out of reach. I will admit, that strategy was a long time coming, but when it did, it worked.

As I age, and in the current pandemic situation, health becomes a possible stress factor. We can do all we and modern medicine have to offer, but sometimes it isn't enough to keep us totally healthy or even alive. How can we not stress over that? Again, I believe we need to beef up our faith. In Philippians 1:21 Paul said, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." And Romans 8:28 says, "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose."

If our faith is strong, we can truly accept that if we live, we are with Christ. If we die we are still with Christ. It is a win/win situation. Rich or poor,

healthy, or not, we truly can be content in whatever state we are in.

ARE YOU CONTENTED?

As I watched the closing ceremonies of the 2021 Summer Olympics, I was impressed with the greatness of the athletes who competed. All of them put in countless hours of training and competing. Even so, the athletes had to compete yet one more time to "qualify" before they could represent the US at the official Olympic

games. Many of them experienced the glory of victory; some felt the agony of defeat. Thousands of hours of training and competition led to and concluded with a relatively short time in actual Olympic competition.

It made me think of the race we run as Christians. It is a far more important race than any race run by athletes. Our race is the marathon of life. The prize we run for is not gold, silver, or bronze medals. Ours is a race for our eternal destiny—the Crown of Life—eternal life! Medals undoubtedly brought some degree of happiness and pride, but the athletes' achievements may not have brought them contentment. Contentment is sometimes elusive.

Contentment can be a state of mind. When soldiers came to Jesus in Luke 3:14 and asked what they should do, "he said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or by false accusation, and be content with your wages.'" The writer of Hebrews urged Jewish Christians, "Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you.'" (Hebrews 13:5).

We can be content when basic needs are filled, as in 1 Timothy 6:8, "But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction." Contentment is not in owning lots of things. Contentment is in belonging to Jesus.

Paul wrote in 1 Timothy 6:6, "...godliness with contentment is great gain." Contentment is valuable. Contentment can be learned, as Paul wrote in Philippians 4:11b-13, "11...I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content. 12 I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. 13 I can do all things through him who strengthens me." Truly, after all he had been through for the cause of Christ, Paul had achieved contentment. Paul certainly lived his Christian life as one who pursued righteousness, but not just for himself. During his lifetime, he taught countless other people to pursue righteousness. His writings continue to teach us today, and his writings will teach generations yet to come, Lord willing.

Paul mastered the ability to be content, regardless of circumstances. He said in 2 Corinthians 12:10, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when

I am weak, then I am strong." Near the end of his life, he wrote, "⁶For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come. ⁷I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing."

Brother Jeff Jenkins wrote a chapter on contentment in his book, "Thoughts from the Mound, 52 Reflections on the Christian Life." He closed his article with the following paragraph: "Contentment from an eternal perspective will be ours when we commune regularly with our Lord, when we compare ourselves only with Christ, when we create opportunities for fellowship with other Christians, and when we concentrate on the joys of being a Christian. May God help us to live every day with contentment from an eternal perspective."

Jesus said in Matthew 5:6, ⁶"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." The word "satisfied" reminded me of an old song by Johnny Cash titled, "Satisfied Mind."
