WHERE IS PEACE?

In the world we live in, there is little in the way of peace. In this country, many are stridently fighting for their "rights." At the same time, some are fighting to restrict the rights of others. Parents are fighting to keep immoral, unhealthy things out of schools' curriculum. Politicians fight each other's ideologies. Parents fight each other, and children fight parents. Insidious diseases strike with little distinction between the aged and the very young. Where is peace?

On September 11, 2021, we observed the 20th anniversary of the horrible terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and a hijacked plane that crashed into a Pennsylvania countryside.

For the Greatest Generation, their historical milestone was Pearl Harbor. For most adults today, our milestone is September 11. Since the attacks in 2001, we have fought two wars connected with those attacks. We are now out of both Iraq and Afghanistan; but terror still exists, and evil still strikes innocent people. Where is peace?

Who can forget the horrifying sight of people in Afghanistan running alongside a huge transport plane, clinging to any handhold they could find, fighting to escape and save themselves from the Taliban. A few managed to hold on long enough to become airborne, but they soon fell to their deaths. Day after day, thousands of desperate people crowded around the Kabul airport for their chance to escape the country. Some were successful; most were not. We saw sickening brutality against anyone targeted by the Taliban as they went house to house killing people who helped America in any way. Where is peace?

More recently, Ukraine was invaded by a maniacal dictator of a neighboring country. Ukrainian cities were

decimated. Apartment complexes were bombed and left burning. Hospitals were targeted and shelled. Hundreds of children died along with adults. Hundreds of thousands of women and children fled to neighboring countries while their husbands and fathers picked up arms to defend their country. How many thousands of widows and fatherless children will be left to rebuild their lives without their husbands and fathers? Where is peace?

Closer to home, inflation is soaring along with higher prices for food, clothing, gasoline, and heating fuel. Politicians posture and blame everyone else for all the problems. Homelessness is on the rise, and drug and alcohol abuse are rampant. Innocent babies are being aborted every day. It seems the whole world will descend into an abyss. Where is peace?

Our world is crazy these days, but it has been since the fall of man in the Garden of Eden. Paul lived in a time of hardship. He personally experienced persecution, deprivation, and imprisonment. Despite it all, he was at peace near the end of his life when he wrote, "For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved His appearing." (2 Timothy 4:6-8)

Shortly before He died on the cross, Jesus reassured His disciples in John 14:27, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to



you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." Jesus also said in

John 16:33: "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world."

Paul often opened his letters with peace, as in these words in 2 Corinthians 1:2, "Grace to you and peace..." He also wrote in Philippians 1:2, "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." He closed many of his letters with peace. Colossians 3:15 is one example: "And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful." Peter wrote in 2 Peter 1:2,

"May grace and peace be multiplied to you in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord."

Where is peace? Peace is in belonging to God, trusting in Him, and leaning on Him. Peace is in setting our minds on the Spirit. "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory." (Colossians 3:1-4).

Peace is in going to my quiet place and reading His word. Peace is in pouring out my heart to Him. Peace is serving Him and our fellow man. Peace is in Jesus, "¹Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. ²In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? ³And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." (John 14:1-3).

"3And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. ⁴He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." (Revelation 21:3-4)

That will be where we find true peace. That will be peace forevermore.

The Path to Peace

A friend gave me a plaque with the word *shalom* on it. One of my favorite gifts, it hangs in the main hallway in our home. *Shalom* is the Hebrew word translated as peace, and means completeness, soundness, and wellbeing.

In Jewish culture, people used *shalom* to greet one another, meaning may you be well. Peace - we all want it, but can we really have peace?

Early in 1 Samuel, we meet Hannah, one of Elkanah's wives. The Lord has closed her womb. Her infertility results in continual bullying by her rival Peninnah. Scripture says she weeps, is not eating, calls herself miserable, is deeply troubled, and in anguish and grief. Hannah is a woman without peace.

Her troubled situation drives her to the Lord. Pouring out her soul to the Lord, she tells Eli, "I have been praying here out of my great anguish and grief." Eli tells Hannah to go in peace (*shalom*). Does she?

Can the anxiety she experiences here, and most likely has plagued her for years, suddenly disappear? Leaving Eli, nothing has really changed. She does not have an answer to her prayer of wanting a son. She is not pregnant.

Yet, something has changed. Scripture tells us "She went her way, ate something and her face was no longer downcast." These words lead us to believe that indeed, something has changed. She now experiences peace. Hannah chooses prayer. Taking her problems to God, trusting Him as she pours out her soul, she finds peace. Prayer is the path to peace.

The Apostle Paul writes, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and petition with



thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all

understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6, 7).

Many who are anxious, troubled, stressed, worried, burdened, or depressed will try and seek peace by shopping, eating, sleeping, vacationing, taking pills or other medication. The path Paul advises is the same path Hannah took. It led Hannah out of anxiety and into peace.

Robert Frost's famous poem, "Two Roads" ends with this verse:

I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in wood and I, I took the one less traveled by
And that has made all the difference.

Take the path of prayer. It leads to peace. It is the path that will make a difference!


Peace

If we follow the directions for how to have peace with our fellow man and we believe the promises Jesus gave us, how can we not rest at peace? We of all people are most blessed.
