## **God's Commandments**

Matthew 22:38, says it all. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it. Love your neighbor as yourself. All the law and the prophets hang on these two commandments."

Jesus says in John 14:15, "If you love me, you will obey what I command." When we obey these command-

ments, all others fall into the place they need to be. If God is my number one priority, I can love my neighbor as I love and care for myself. I can love my enemies, Matthew 5:43-48. If God is not number one, it becomes almost impossible to enemies.



If He is number one, I will add the virtues to my life that Peter talks about in 2 Peter 1:5-11 - faith, goodness, knowledge, self-control, perseverance, brotherly kindness, and love. My "life life" will be in line with my prayer life. I heard the above phrase many years ago at a prayer retreat I attended. If I have open and often communication with my heavenly Father, my life will be transformed. Romans 12:2 says, "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed (changed) by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is - His good, pleasing, and perfect will." 2 Corinthians 3:18 says, "And we all, who with unveiled faces, contemplate the Lord's glory are being transformed into His image with everincreasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit."

My life must be transformed, changed into the image of my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Transformation is a

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command, not a suggestion. God does not make suggestions, which is a mistaken idea the world has. They believe God's commands can be "taken or left, obeyed or not obeyed. It's a choice." True, we have a choice, but if we choose to disobey, we will reap the consequences, no matter who we are. Commandments are orders given by God for our eternal benefit.

Even though I have very limited first-hand experience with our military, I know when commanders give orders to their troops, they expect immediate obedience. The consequences of disobedience can be very severe, resulting in possible court martial, imprisonment and/or dishonorable discharge. The penalties are severe because these soldiers have taken an oath to obey orders. Every branch of the military is trained and exists for the protection of the country we live in. In most cases, military officers do not make suggestions.

In my years of sharing the gospel with others, I've heard statements that make me cringe — "I'll take my chances with God. If I try to live by the ten commandments (Exodus 20) and the "golden rule" (Matthew 7:12), I'll be fine." In other words, "If I live a good life, I'll go to heaven." They understand neither the character of God nor their own sinful state. Most have no desire to know.

Unfortunately, some Christians have the same idea about God. They seem to have one foot in the church and one foot in the world. Their attendance to worship is sporadic. They don't have an open line of communication with the Father. When prayer and Bible study are weak, their faith begins to weaken. Even sporadic attendance to worship stops. Satan has pulled that "one foot in the church" completely out, and now both feet are firmly planted in the world. They don't realize their precarious position. 2 Peter 2:20 says, "If they have escaped the corruption of the world by knowing our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ and are again entangled in them and overcome, they are worse off at the end than they were at the beginning. It would have been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness than to have known it and then to turn their backs on the sacred command that was passed on to them. Of them the proverbs are true: 'A dog returns to its vomit, and a sow that is washed returns to her wallowing in the mud."" This is not a pretty picture!

Our Christian lives are continually growing, 2 Peter 3:18. We continue to grow because we will never reach perfection in this life. We are all sinners saved by the precious blood of Jesus. Sometimes we struggle all our lives with one thing or another, so it seems our road is

always uphill. We can and do become discouraged. Intellectually, we may know that Jesus says our burdens are light and momentary - but emotionally, for the moment, they feel very heavy. Discouragement is a tool of satan to pull us away from God. If we take our eyes off Jesus, it's easy to stumble. Therefore, we must continually outfit ourselves with God's armor (Ephesians 6:10-18). God provided armor for our spiritual safety. I must put on the helmet of salvation. The shield of faith and the belt of truth guide me to salvation and then provide for my protection. The helmet is worn on the head, which is the most vulnerable part of our body. If our head (brain) is injured, we go down immediately. Satan always aims high with his fiery darts with intent to destroy. I must begin quickly to put on the breastplate of righteousness and fit my feet with readiness to go with the gospel of peace. My shield of faith and the sword of the Spirit, the word of God, protect me as I go. Each piece of armor has a very important place in our protection. I cannot leave one piece off, lest satan finds that one chink in my armor and tries to wriggle in.

That does not mean I won't slip and sin in my walk. The key word in 2 Peter 2:20 is "overcome." I must never be overcome in my sin. When I do slip, I have the choice to repent and come back to God. He's always there with open and waiting arms. May we all always wear our protective armor in Jesus Christ.

#### THE LORD'S ARMY

The words above are a song we teach to our children early in their lives. They love marching with their feet, imaginatively riding a horse, clapping their hands when "shooting" the enemy, and spreading their arms in flight. At the end, they smartly salute!

In Leviticus 22:31, God commanded Israel through Moses, "So you shall keep my commandments and do them: I am the LORD." The purpose of the US military is for the defense of our nation and our allies so that peace prevails in our country. All branches of our military (Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard) have mission statements. Their mission statements are tailored to their separate branches, but ALL their mission statements are focused upon defending our nation and winning our wars. Individual branches are to be ready to fight anytime, anywhere, in uniform or out of uniform. They take their missions very seriously.

Likewise, Christians have a mission statement given by Jesus shortly before He was crucified. <sup>15</sup>And he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation. <sup>16</sup>Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned.' (Mark 16:15-16). Are we as serious about our mission as our American military is about their mission? Are we ready at all times to teach the soulsaving gospel?

Unlike our military men and women who fight with physical weapons of war, Christians "march into battle" to save souls from eternal punishment. The military requires uniform clothing and behavior. Our Commander also requires circumspect clothing and behavior. Our

Christian clothing is detailed in Ephesians 6:14-15, <sup>14</sup>Stand therefore, having fastened on the <u>belt</u> of truth, and having put on the <u>breastplate</u> of righteousness, <sup>15</sup>and, as <u>shoes</u> for your feet, having put on the



readiness given by the <u>gospel of peace</u>. Our <u>behavior</u> is to include the qualities listed in 2 Peter 1:5-7: <sup>5</sup><u>virtue</u>, <sup>6</sup><u>knowledge</u>, <u>self-control</u>, <u>steadfastness</u>, <u>godliness</u>,

<sup>7</sup>brotherly affection, and <u>love</u>. <sup>8</sup>For if these qualities are yours and are increasing, they keep you from being ineffective or unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. We want to be fruitful in His service.

Our weapons are very different from weapons used by the military. Our weapons are the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, (Ephesians 6:17), and the soulsaving gospel of Christ, which Paul described in 1 Corinthians 15:1-4, <sup>1</sup>Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, <sup>2</sup>and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. Obedience to this gospel is by dying to our sins, being buried (immersed) in water, and being raised to new life in Christ which frees us from the bondage of sin and death.

America's President is referred to as the Commander in Chief. He has enormous power, both in this country and on the world stage. His power, however, is limited. As Christians, our commander is Jesus, who said in John "If you love me, you will keep my 14:15: commandments." He went on to say in John 14:21a, <sup>21</sup>Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me. Our spiritual commander in chief has all power and authority in Ephesians 1:20-22 20... which He brought about in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places, <sup>21</sup>far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. <sup>22</sup>And He put all things in subjection under His feet, and made Him head over all things to the church.

American men and women in military service have fought for peace in far-flung parts of the globe. Our battlefields are in our neighborhoods, cities, and nation as we teach the lost a better way to live in this world and how to have eternal life at the day of judgment.

Paul said the gospel had been taught to the then-known world, ... <sup>22</sup>yet He has now reconciled you in His body of flesh through death, in order to present you before Him holy and blameless and beyond reproach if indeed you continue in the faith firmly established and steadfast, and not shifting from the hope of the gospel that you have heard, which was proclaimed in all creation under heaven, and of which I, Paul, was made a minister. (Colossians 1:22-23) Thousands of Christians have

worked/are working in many mission fields all over the world and in this country as well.

1 John 5:2-3, <sup>2</sup>By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and follow His commandments. <sup>3</sup>For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments; and His commandments are not burdensome. Members of our armed forces are sometimes awarded medals for courage and bravery in battle. Our Lord leads His army to victory in our battle with sin and death. Our reward will be eternal rejoicing in heaven at the throne of God.

The Commander we serve is Supreme. The battle we fight is a spiritual battle for the souls around us. We are armed with the gospel of peace, and our mission is to seek and save the lost. Let us all come to attention and go into battle behind our Lord, the Commander!
